



Your Rights

Under the law, parents and families must:

Be included in Title I budget decision-making and the development of a parent and family engagement policy that is distributed to all parents, to the local community and announced at an annual meeting.

Be involved in the planning and implementation of parent and family engagement programs.

Receive materials and training for parents and staff to foster greater family engagement.

Have the opportunity to jointly develop, with school staff; a school-home compact that outlines how parents, the entire school staff, and students will share the responsibility for improved student academic achievement.
